Subject: Specter Center Hosts 422 Students for SEA's 18th Team Nationals

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Cincinnati Squash Academy, StreetSquash, and CitySquash Prevail at Team Nationals in Philadelphia

SEA brought together 422 middle and high school students from 17 U.S. cities earlier this month for Team Nationals, a three-day tournament for participants across our network of member organizations. Originally

scheduled to take place in January, this was SEA's first national tournament in two years and the 18th national team tournament in our network's history. With 80 five-player teams competing, the marquee event took place at the extraordinary Arlen Specter U.S. Squash Center in Philadelphia. In addition to the more than 715 matches played, the weekend featured an academic awards ceremony, visits from college representatives, and remarks from an SEA alumnus.

Split into three divisions, the weekend's big winners in the A Division were CitySquash Bronx, which captured the High School Girls' and Middle School Boys' titles, Harlem's StreetSquash, which took home the High School Boys' trophy, and, Cincinnati Squash Academy, which earned its first national team victory in the Middle School Girls' draw.

SEA is grateful to all who made the memorable weekend possible, especially U.S. Squash and the Specter Center, Sakora Miller, Julia Thompson, and Kim Clearkin, our tournament assistants and staff, and all the programs that traveled to participate.

"After a two-year hiatus due to COVID, I'm so glad we could host Team Nationals this year," says SEA Director of Squash Edgardo Gonzalez. "It was amazing to bring the SEA network back together again, to watch our players compete on the court, and build everlasting relationships off the court. The Specter Center was the perfect host venue, and we can't wait to return in a few months for SEA Individual Nationals."

The Harlem squad came out on top, with all five players winning their matches 3-0.



In the first major team win for the Ohio program, Cincinnati Squash Academy's Rona, Leah, Laell, Ruth, and Diane won the middle school girls' championship in a 3-2 victory over CitySquash.



CitySquash's Joannes, Rodrigo, James, Michael, and Sergio won the middle school boys' trophy after defeating SquashSmarts and SquashBusters Lawrence.
